Renault R 35 – Musée des Blindés, Saumur (France) Some fitting remains on the hull's roof showed that it is a former 4.7 cm Pak (t) (Sfl.) auf Fgst.Pz.Kpfw.35 R 731 (f) (Yuri Pasholok) <u>http://yuripasholok.livejournal.com/4465862.html</u>, but these fittings were removed in 2021 during the tank's last restoration. During the restoration, its original serial number was uncovered as 50973, indicating that it was received by the 21ème bataillon de chars de combat in september, 1939 and it has been repainted accordingly (info from the museum)

Renault R 35 – Musée des Blindés, Saumur (France)

Serial Number 945, Reg Number 50945. This tank has been upgunned by Lebanon with a British 40 mm Ordnance QF 2-pounder gun after 1945 (Colleurs de Plastique forum, Wikipedia). It has been restored by France 40 véhicules association, which kept its Lebanese modification (France 40 véhicules association)

R 35 – Museum of the Resistance and Deportation of Picardie, Fargniers (France) Serial Number 66, Reg Number 50066. This tank was part of the CPTICC (shooting practice and instruction center for Combat Tanks) in 1940, and then transferred for a short time to the "Parc de Rosny". On 18 June, 1940, this tank was integrated to the 2^{ème} BCC (Combat Tank Battalion) and assigned to the 2nd Company on 22 June, 1940. This tank was formerly displayed outside the Caverne du Dragon Museum near Hurtebise. It was restored by association France 40 véhicules in 2014

Renault R 35 – France 40 véhicules Museum, Fismes (France) The lower hull has been acquired in June 2013, the turret comes from an unknown location. Serial Number 1484, Registration 51484. It has been destroyed in Normandy in 1944 and later converted to a bulldozer to refill the bomb craters. The cast upper hull was reproduced using one of Saumur Museum's R-35 as a model

Renault R 35 – 12ème BSMAT, Gien (France) The turret sits a bit "too high" on the hull. The hull was most probably modified by German troops during WW2, and there is possibly an uncorrect turret ring (from a Hotchkiss tank) or no turret ring at all, which is why the turret is ill-fitted

Somua S 35 – Bovington Tank Museum (UK) This tank is one of 297 captured by the Germans after the fall of France. We can tell this from the modified cupola on top of the turret. They used them across Europe for internal security and training. It has since been painted as a tank of the 4e Cuirassiers in May 1940 (Museum)

Somua S 35 – Patriot Park, Kubinka (Russia) Ex-French Somua S 35, Serial Number 10672, built in 1939. Served in 3ème Divison Légère Motorisée (3ème DLM). Converted to Pz.Kpfw.35 S (f), issued to Pz.Ab.211 with turret number 121. Captured in Finland on 9 September, 1944. It had zimmerit in 1944 (Yuri Pasholok)

B1 bis – Bovington Tank Museum (UK) This vehicle was captured by the Germans in 1940, who fitted extra armour to the turret ring. It was assigned to 1st Platoon, 1st Company of Panzer Abteilung 213 and shipped to the Channel Island of Jersey in Spring 1942. The British captured it when they liberated the islands in 1945 (Museum). The plate carries the SN 36

B1 bis "Rhône" – Heintz Barracks, Bastogne (Belgium) This tank carries a Somua S 35 turret and the main gun is a steel-made reproduction (Antoine Misner). It is on loan from Saumur

B1 bis "Rhin" – Musée des Blindés, Saumur (France) – running condition

This tank belonged to the 41st BCC (combat tank battalion) in 1939-40. Its real identity has been discovered during a restoration thanks to the manufacturer's plate added by the Germans after 1940, which partially preserved its 1940 paint and nickname. The tank has been accurately repainted from recently discovered wartime color photos (Chars français website)

B1 bis wreck – MM Park, La Wantzenau (France) This tank was identified as being the N° 243 "INTREPIDE", which was part of the 8th Combat Tank Battalion and was destroyed at Moreuil on 1st June 1940. The tank will be fully restored, according to the restoration team of the MM Park museum

Hotchkiss H 35 – Camiers (France)

This turretless tank is most probably a remain of the Dunkerque gap fightings, which happened in May-June 1940. The missing turret could have been used on a fixed bunker, as a defensive position, but this is unconfirmed. The tank was dredged few weeks ago thanks to the tide. It was discovered on the beach at Camiers, a town located between Boulogne-sur-Mer and Le Touquet (Pas-de-Calais, Northern France, near Belgium). The Tank Museum at Saumur wanted to recover it in, but as the preservation process is expensive (Special Processing against salt), it has been delayed to an unknown date. It is the only unmodified Hotchkiss H 35 tank still surviving today (info. from various sources)

Hotchkiss H 39 – Musée des Blindés, Saumur (France) This tank has been restored in the markings of a vehicle of the 14ème BCC, compagnie d'échelon

Hotchkiss H-39 – MM Park, La Wantzenau, near Strasbourg (France)

Chassis number 41104. This tank was armed with an SA 38 long barelled 37mm gun. This wreck was recovered from a bog in Norway in November, 2015. The vehicle belonged to 2eme Régiment de Cuirassiers before the germans captured it and took it to Norway. It was probably used on the Russian/Finnish border to fight against the Red army. It was found in the far north of Norway (info. from the owner). The trench crossing tail one of two left in the world

The top including the turret is unfortunately long gone, but as a plus, we found the original engine in his barn (former owner)

B1 Bis "Capitaine de Bournazel" wreck – Militaire Association Troyenne (France) The B1 bis tank "Capitaine de Bournazel" got bogged down in a swamp on 17 May 1940. It was impossible to recover it, so it was sabotaged and abandoned by its crew. Shortly after the war, the upper part of the hull was scrapped and the bottom part was forgotten during 50 years. The tank was discovered again by Bruno Tabare and recovered in February 1992. Information from Misner, le char B1 bis "Capitaine de Bournazel"
