Surviving Flamethrower Shermans

Listed here are the Sherman flamethrower tanks that still exist today.



M4A3(75)W CWS-POA-H5 Sherman (2-barreled) – Fort Stewart Museum, GA (USA) Same flamethrower variant as above. Serial Number 62203, built by Fisher in September, 1944 (USA AFVs register)

M4A3(75)W CWS-POA-H5 Sherman (2-barreled) Pima Air and Space Museum, Tucson, AZ (USA)

SN 49617, built by Fisher in May, 1944. Jon Bernstein uncovered the original markings of Lt Leonard Blake's Sherman tank "Lucky" that served on Iwo Jima with Company C, 5th Tank battalion, USMC. In July/Aug, 1945, it was converted as a Chemical Warfare Service, Pacific Ocean Area, Hawaii flamethrower tank. The tank was recovered from the ranges at Camp LeJeune NC, in 2003 or 2004. 70 of the CWS-POA-H5 variant were built in 1945, but no one has see combat use before the end of the war. Some have seen service during the Korean war

M4A3(75)W CWS-POA-H5 Sherman (2-barreled)

Marine Corps Air Ground Center, Twenty-Nine Palms, CA (USA) SN 62204, built by Fisher in September, 1944. USMC 102554 (John Lewis). Probably a veteran of Company B, 4th Marines Tank Battalion, which served on Iwo Jima. This unit was the only one to weld cages to cover portions of the sponsons near the driver's hatches (Romain Cansière). It has been converted to CWS-POA-H5 later in 1945

M4A1(75) Flamethrower – Army Chemical Corps Museum, Ft Leonard Wood, MO (USA) It doesn't look like one of the Hawaiian CWS-POA-H5. It has the overflow pipe in the M42B1 Flamethrower location. Moreover, the "look" of the flame tube would be a clue of a Flamethrower tank made in the US, in imitation of the Hawaiian jobs (Joe DeMarco)

This tank was previously on display at Ft McClellan (USA AFVs register). 151 M42B1 were manufactured by M.W. Kellogg company, but they were not used in combat during WW2
